Login Opportunity: Knowledge sector jobs have the greatest potential for expansion. Regional cities and local government areas (LGAs) with good existing broadband connectivity and workforce capacity are best positioned to build an online workforce (see over).

Login Benefits: Online work widens access to employment and customer markets, helps increase productivity and lowers business overheads. It can help grow and retain populations in regional

Logout Challenge: Many LGAs have low levels of broadband connectivity and limited workforce capacity. The NBN rollout will be crucial to enable these areas to realise their potential for online work.

Logout Risk: Online work will open up some types of work and some regional markets to more competition from cities and other regions. Regional businesses will need to ensure that they have developed their capacity to compete.


The essential elements for online work
