Almost one in five (19%) metro residents are considering a move to regional Australia despite a return to 'normal life' post-pandemic.


### THE PULL OF THE REGIONS IS DRIVING **CONSIDERATION TO MOVE.**

Five 'pull' factors grew significantly in 2023 v 2020:
























Young people believed there are many opportunities for professional, skilled and low skilled roles in our regions.







This infographic has been created using data collected between 21 March and 2 April 2023, surveying Australians 18+ who lived in metro Brisbane,

Sydney, Melbourne and Perth. A total of 3,315 people were contacted to participate in the research, 2,211 people we screened out who were not considering a move to regional Australia. 1,004 people completed the full survey, including interviews that were roughly 20 mins. Anyone outside of metro Bris/Syd/Mel/Perth was excluded, and we aimed to achieve a balance of gender, age, household income and location.

The maximum margin of error (at the 95% confidence interval) on the total sample size is +/- 3%.
